Syarikat reka bentuk diserbu

Shah Alam: Sebuah syarikat reka bentuk dalam diserbu Kementerian Perdagangan Dalam Negeri dan Hal Ehwal Pengguna (KPDNHEP) Selangor, semalam, selepas dipercayai memiliki perisian AutoCad salinan langgaran.

Pengarahnya, Muhammad Zikril Azan Abdullah berkata, serbuan terhadap premis di Pusat Perniagaan Bestari, Taman Perindustrian Air Hitam, Klang itu dilakukan selepas menerima aduan daripada wakil hak cipta.

"Operasi dijalankan jam 12 tengah hari dan diketuai pegawai KPDNHEP, Azri Mohamed Armia. Turut menyertai wakil pemilik hak cipta perisian itu.

"Kami memeriksa 11 komputer di premis itu mendapati hanya dua komputer yang ada perisian salinan langgaran iaitu perisian AutoCad," katanya dalam satu kenyataan, semalam.

Beliau berkata, KPDNHEP kemudian bertindak menyita dua set komputer lengkap yang bernilai RM6,000 itu.

MyCC siasat terperinci dakwaan monopoli Grab

Suruhanjaya mahu tingkat usaha kerajaan kukuhkan persaingan

Malaysia menjalankan siasat antimonopoli lebih terperinci ke atas firma e-hailing berpangkalan di Singapura, Grab Holdings Inc, yang meningkatkan lagi usaha kerajaan untuk mengukuhkan persaingan dalam ekonomi.

Ketua Pegawai Eksekutif Suruhanjaya Persaingan Malaysia (MyCC), Iskandar Ismail, berkata pengawal selia antimonopoli itu meningkatkan siasatnya ke atas syarikat pemula niaga berkenaan, yang mula diumumkan tahun lalu oleh Kementerian Pengangkutan.

Beliau enggan mengulas langkah spesifik diambil oleh suruhanjaya terbabit.

Siasatan dibuat susulan pelbagai aduan bermula tahun lalu yang menuduh Grab mengamalkan monopoli selepas ia membeli operasi Uber Technologies Inc di Asia Tenggara.

Wakil Grab tidak memberikan maklum balas kepada e-mel yang dihantar bagi mendapatkan kenyataan.

Pesaing Grab, Gojek merancang memasuki pasaran dengan motosikal, dengan pengurusan tertingginya bertemu Perdana Menteri, Tun Dr Mahathir Mohamad di Kuala Lumpur, bulan lalu.

Dr Mahathir berhasrat menurunkan kos hidup rakyat Malaysia, janji utama yang membawanya kembali berkuasa tahun lalu.

Kerajaannya berusaha mende-

dahkan syarikat milik negara kepada persaingan dan memperkenalkan tender terbuka, antaranya dengan mengarahkan Telekom Malaysia Bhd (TM) berkongsi rangkaian kabel jalur lebar berkelajuan tinggi dengan pengendali lain.

Ja juga menimbang untuk membenarkan pengguna memilih pembekal tenaga, selain daripada syarikat utiliti negara, Tenaga Nasional Bhd (TNB).

Persaingan lebih tinggi mengukuhkan kedudukan Malaysia sebagai destinasi perniagaan.

"Ia menghantar isyarat kepada pelabur asing yang mahu memasuki Malaysia bahawa negara ini akan menjadi lapangan persai-

ngan adil tanpa memihak syarikat tertentu disebabkan hubungan politik atau sebab lain," kata Ahli Ekonomi Asia di Capital Economics, Alex Holmes.

Sebagai sebahagian usaha kerajaan mengatasi ketirisan dalam perbelanjaan awam, Iskandar berkata, MyCC meneliti beberapa syarikat yang membida kontrak kerajaan di atas kemungkinan mengamalkan penipuan bidaan.

Mac lalu, ia berkata, lapan syarikat membentuk kartel untuk memanipulasi bidaan tender membabitkan perkhidmatan teknologi maklumat untuk institusi berkaitan kerajaan.

GREATER COMPETITION PUSH

MyCC STEPS UP PROBE INTO GRAB

Investigation follows complaints accusing ride-hailing startup of monopolistic practices, says watchdog

KUALA LUMPUR

MALAYSIA is advancing an anti-monopoly investigation into Singapore-based Grab Holdings Inc, ramping up a broader government push to bring greater competition to its economy.

Malaysia Competition Commission (MyCC) chief executive officer Iskandar Ismail said last Thursday the anti-monopoly watchdog was stepping up the probe into the ride-hailing startup, which was first announced last year by the transport ministry.

The investigation follows multiple complaints starting from last year accusing Grab of monopolistic practices after it bought Uber Technologies Inc's Southeast Asian operations.

Grab's rival Gojek was planning to enter the market with motorcycles, and its top management met with Prime Minister Tun Dr Mahathir Mohamad, here, last month.

Dr Mahathir is keen to lower the cost of living for Malaysians, a key pledge that led to his return to power last year.

The government is trying to expose state-linked companies to competition and introduce open tenders, ordering Telekom Malaysia Bhd to share its high-speed broadband cable network with other operators.

It's also considering to allow consumers choose power suppliers other than state-

owned Tenaga Nasional Bhd.

Greater competition could enhance Malaysia's standing as a business destination.

"It sends a signal to foreign investors wanting to enter Malaysia that it's going to be a fair playing field without unfair advantages to favoured companies because of political connections or other reasons," said Capital Economics Asia economist Alex Holmes.

As part of a government effort to stamp out wastage in public spending, Iskandar said the commission was looking into a few companies pitching for state contracts for possible bid-rigging practices.

In March, it said eight companies formed cartels to manipulate bids on tenders involving information technology services for a state-linked institution. That was its first bid-rigging case in state procurement since the body's establishment in 2011.

Iskandar said his commission was fielding more requests from state agencies and private companies wanted to learn how to detect bid-rigging and other anti-competitive practices, and was receiving broad government support.

"Our minister gives us a lot of room," he said, referring to Domestic Trade and Consumer Affairs Minister Datuk Seri Saifuddin Nasution. "He just says, 'Go do your job and we will support you all the way'."

ANTI-MONOPOLY WATCHDOG STEPS UP GRAB PROBE

THE Malaysia Competition Commission is stepping up its probe into Grab Holdings Inc over a possible monopolistic practice in the ride-hailing industry.

According to a *Bloomberg* report, the commission's chief executive officer Iskandar Ismail said the government is also ramping up a broader push to bring greater competition to the economy.

Iskandar, however, decline to elaborate on specific steps the commission was taking against the Singapore-based firm and what the escalation entailed.
